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Flush Those Potty Words Down the Drain!

Potty talk seems to be everywhere these days: on the playground, in the classroom, on TV, and in movies. However, it certainly isn't cute or funny when it's coming from our children's mouths (especially when it happens in public)! In most cases, you're watching a thoughtful experiment on your preschooler's part. He's clearly heard someone else say something with a level of intensity or distaste, and wants to see what happens when he gives it a go. Here are some tips to stop potty talk:

Try to figure out where your child is picking these words up. Make sure you and your spouse aren't using inappropriate language around your child, Young children absorb information from television programs so make sure that she watches shows that are appropriate for her age and, whenever possible, watch the television with your child.

Don't overreact, or you'll just remind him how much power he has to make you quickly pay attention to him. Children feed off your reactions and freaking out would just fuel your child's desire to use potty talk in the future. Calmly let your child know that the word or phrase isn't appropriate, and then let it go. Sometimes your child is just trying out the word to get a reaction from you, something that is extremely satisfying when you're a child; if you don't give an interesting reaction, the word will lose its appeal.

Resist the urge to laugh as it only reinforces the behavior. Try not to act disgusted when you change your child's diaper. Making a point of naming his diaper's contents isn't recommended, either, as he'll learn that naming bodily functions elicits a reaction. It is normal for a child who is potty training to be fascinated with his body and everything that comes out of it.

If it's an insult, tell her that there's no such thing and you don't understand what she's saying. In a clear, matter-of-fact, and disinterested voice, explain name which words are off-limits. Potty talk won't be looked upon kindly anywhere. Explain that these words make people uncomfortable and hurt their feelings. You should also emphasize that it is still not ok, even if other children are using the same language. While preschoolers are still learning to be empathetic, they still need to know that his actions have an effect on them.

Finally, know that it's never too early to teach your child that potty talk is inappropriate and not allowed. Most of the time, children use potty words just because they sound silly; persuade her to use an alternative that sounds more exciting or silly! Think "Abracadabra" or "Zoinks." Dr. Seuss is a terrific source (Zizzer Zazzer Zuzz!) or you can make some up together. Maybe he is having trouble finding appropriate words to express frustration or anger, so you can explain that "I'm angry" would be a better choice.



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Winter Ideas

Hand & Foot Reindeer

Dip the kids' hands and feet in brown paint to make this adorable reindeer. Their pinkies are used to make the red nose. Use this poem for each one (you can modify for different holidays):
This isn't just a reindeer,



As you can plainly see.

I made him with my hands and foot,

Which are a part of me.

He comes with lots of love to say:

"I hope you have a Merry Christmas Day!"

Handprint Wreaths



Dip each child's hands in green paint for the wreath, pinkies in red for berries.

"My hands made the wreath; My fingers made the berries. I hope you have a Christmas That is very merry!"

Circle Candy Canes

Cut out (or each child can cut out) red and white circles from construction paper. Give each child a candy-cane shaped base (heavyweight paper is best), then they glue the circles on in any pattern they choose.



Pine Cone Christmas Trees



Let each child choose a pinecone, and then they can decorate them with poms, glitter glue, sequins, and other small items.

Man in the Moon Santa

Cut out crescent shape moons with a nose. Kids can paint or cut out a red hat, then add cotton balls on the hat and beard, with a googly eye.



Snowball (Tune of "Tiny Tim")

I made myself a snowball just as perfect as could be. I thought I'd keep it as a pet and let it sleep with me. I gave it some pajamas and a pillow for its head.

Then, last night it ran away, but first -it wet the bed!

Hand & Foot Angels



This little angel is special, you see, because he is a part of me. His wings are my hands, His body, my feet, And on the wall he will look very

Use yellow or gold for handprint wings, and any color the child chooses for the footprint robe. Add a small headshot of the child at the heel for the head. Add a gold metallic pipe cleaner for a halo.

Cupcake Liner Snowpeople

Give each child at least 3 cupcake liners (or 3 regular and 3 minis). They flatten then glue them onto construction paper; add raisins, chocolate chips, paper carrot noses, buttons, and paper hats to complete them.



Marshmallow Snowpeople



Give each child a bunch of marshmallows and some glue (Glue Pens from Discount School Supply are awesome). It helps to show an example and talk about how snowmen are typically arranged. They can add paper hats, buttons, eyes, "carrot" noses, pretzel stick arms, etc.

Clothespin Polar Bears (or sheep)

Glue 2 clothespins to a craft stick, using one for the "front legs" and one for the "back legs." After they have dried, give one to each child and let them glue cotton balls onto it. They attach googly eyes and ears (foam, paper, or sequins) and voila!



"Dancing Snowflakes" (Tune of "Frere Jacques")
Dancing snowflakes, dancing snowflakes,
Turn around, turn around.

Whirling, twirling snowflakes, Whirling, twirling snowflakes

Hit the ground, hit the ground (fall to the ground).

"I'm a Little Snowman" (Tune of "I'm a Little Teapot")
